Well, like we did last year, in the weeks leading up to Easter, this year we once again are going to bless ourselves as God's family here by hearing from voices out of our congregation as messages are brought to us by others other than the normal guy. This was a great blessing to me and I believe and heard a blessing to many others last year. This year, kind of on a little bit smaller scale, but over the next few weeks, we're going to be hearing from some other folks out of our congregation. Today we're going to be hearing from Stan Schmidt. Stan has been a faithful worshiper with us over the last many years, sitting right there on Sunday mornings. Um And many of you know and have been blessed by Stan's uncommonly deep thinking and and really wonderful gift for communication. Written communication is what we're familiar with so far, but he's blessed us at many times in our devotional booklets right up to the one that we're enjoying right now leading up to Easter today. What What some of you may know, but many of you perhaps don't know, is that among his many, and i he can list them for you later if if he wants or you can ask him, but among his many advanced degrees includes a degree in theology.

He and I have spent some time together chatting every once in a while about things theological. I have enjoyed his insights and and fellowship. Another thing that you may not know is that Stan is a gifted writer. And in some ways, I'd say probably an extraordinarily gifted writer, because what he's most known for around the world is math curriculum books. Now that sounds exciting, doesn't it?But he's written a whole curriculum from basic math all the way, I believe, up to calculus, under the heading Life of Fred. That sounds like a math book, doesn't it?And I actually have not seen them, but I've heard about them. And in these books, Stan teaches math concepts by using interesting life circumstances and engaging puzzles to teach math, which sounds to me like quite a chore that he set for himself. And And then all these math creaking books that people are using in home schools in various places, I think around the world. I'm I'm fascinated by that. I mean, how do you how do you write, you know, about somebody going into the grocery store and then stopping for a moment, you know, to do a differential equation or a quadratic equation to figure out what they're going to buy in the grocery store

that day?I don't know. But apparently he's able to do that. So I'm really excited to welcome my friend Stan Schmidt to come and preach for us today. But before he comes, I'm going to read the scripture for us. As we continue, oh you know one other thing to mention, this life of Fred idea makes me think of our theme as we head into Easter, you know, behold the man. We're going to look at Jesus as we head into Easter. Stan's going to help us do that today. But I think, you know, life of Fred, you know, it's really life of everybody that we're talking about here, for it is good for everyone to prepare for Easter, and it's good for everyone as they do so. To look to Jesus. Well, we're going to keep trying to do that today. We're going to do it using texts from Ecclesiastes and the Gospel of John. Hear the word of God, first from Ecclesiastes chapter 2, verses four through 6, and then chapter 11. I made great works. I built houses and planted vineyards for myself. I made myself gardens and parks and planted in them all kinds of fruit trees. I made myself pool from which to water the forest of growing trees. And then skipping down to verse 11. Then I considered all that my hands had done and the toil I had expended in doing it. And behold, all was vanity and a striving after

One and done. Fruit does not last. Fruit that lasts sounds crazy. Some people I've talked to said that Jesus really didn't mean it literally. If he had wanted to take it seriously, He might have said that we should bring forth mountains that will last, or build church buildings that will last a thousand years. But fruit? Was Jesus joking? After all, he joked on many occasions. Elton Trueblood's book, The Humor of Christ, is filled with examples. Maybe when Jesus said, I choose you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, he was speaking of a kind of recycling. When we obey the commands to love, when we plan a birthday party, or speak words of forgiveness, or make coffee for the coffee hour, that's a kind of stone in the pond ripple. The waves are big to start with, but then they spread out and they diminish. Everyone knows that you can't see the ripples an hour after you've thrown the stone in the water. You can't hear great grandpas whispering to his wife those words of love. Can't hear him.
